SENATE BILL 6

- Known as the Damon Allen Act
- Changed procedures for:
 - Setting the amount of bail
 - Release of certain defendants on a monetary or personal bond
 - Judicial education on setting bail
 - Duties of magistrates in criminal cases
 - Reporting information pertaining to bail bonds
- Required:
 - The implementation of a standardized public safety report system (PSRS) for statewide use:
 - PSRS went live on **April 1**st, **2022**
 - Produces a public safety report (PSR)
 - Creates a Bail Form
 - Magistrates must consider the PSR for defendants charged with a Class B misdemeanor or higher offense




WHAT IS THE PUBLIC SAFETY REPORT SYSTEM?


- Standardized system for statewide use
- Automon (https://automon.com/)
 - Contracted vendor
 - 6,278 registered users in the system as of December 6th 2022
- PSRS provides a summary report of criminal history for magistrates to consider
 - Alerts if individual is not eligible for personal bond
 - Contains required statutory and discretionary bond conditions
- Designed to capture bail related data for the entire state
 - Produces a bail form that is published on public website containing:
 - Defendant name
 - Arrest date
 - County
 - Magistrate name
 - Bail amount and type
 - Bond conditions



PUBLIC SAFETY REPORT SYSTEM PROCESS




Completed Bail Forms by Month





Top 10 Counties Completed Bail Forms









ODONNELL CONSENT DECREE

In November 2019 Harris County stakeholders entered the ODonnell Consent Decree.

In a 2021 Duke School of Law Judicature publication, the Independent Monitor Mr. Brandon Garrett wrote about the Damon Allen Act as proposed, "The bill would also conflict with some of the terms of the ODonnell Consent Decree."

OCA believes the Decree presented challenges in capturing bail information for defendants who are released without a bail form being completed.
